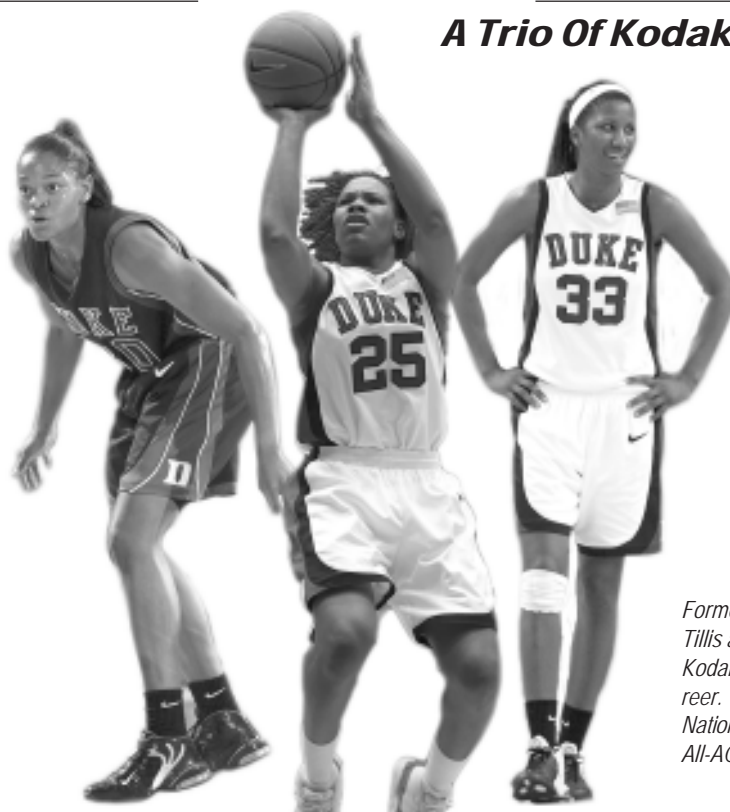

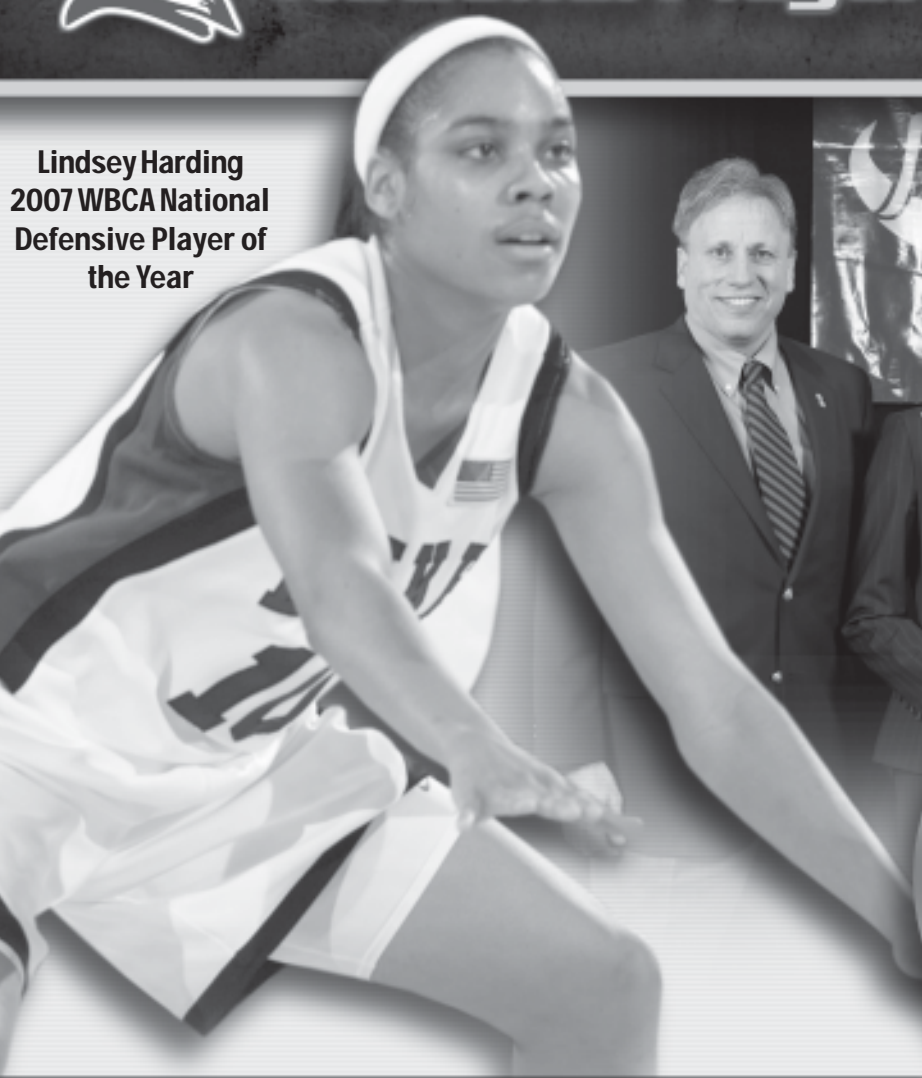

WBCA Defensive Player of the Year

Lindsey Harding, 2007

Alana Beard became the first Duke women's basketball player in school history to earn National Player of the Year accolades in 2003. Beard earned the Victor Award and ESPN.com National Player of the Year, after averaging 22.0 points, 6.9 rebounds, 3.0 assists, 2.8 steals and 1.3 blocks as a junior.

In 2004, Beard was named winner of the State Farm Wade Trophy, the inaugural Wooden Award, ESPN.com, Associated Press and USBWA National Player of the Year honors, after posting averages of 19.7 points, 5.4 rebounds, 3.9 assists and 2.4 steals.

Since 1999, Duke has registered at least one player on the Kodak All-America squad every year except one. Michele VanGorp earned the first Kodak selection for Duke in 1999 and since then Georgia Schweitzer, Beard, Iciss Tillis and Monique Currie and Lindsey Harding have each been selected.

VanGorp averaged 16.9 points, 5.5 rebounds, 1.1 assists and 1.0 blocks in 1999 as the Blue Devils advanced to the NCAA Final Four and ACC Championship game for the first time in school history. She played a huge role in defeating the three-time defending NCAA Champion Tennessee to advance to the Final Four.

In 2001, Schweitzer guided Duke to a 30-4 record and a trip to the NCAA Tournament Sweet 16, while averaging 14.1 points, 4.7 rebounds, 4.1 assists and 1.5 steals. She hit a then school-record 65 three-pointers on the season.

Currie was the runner-up for numerous National Player of the Year awards in 2004-05 and challenged for a second straight season in 2005-06.

In 2006-07, Lindsey Harding was named Naismith and ESPN.com National Player of the Year after averaging 13.6 points, 4.0 rebounds, 3.0 assists and 1.5 steals. She helped guide Duke to a perfect 29-0 mark in the regular season becoming the first ACC squad and 14th team in NCAA history to go undefeated in the regular season.

Harding was also selected the inaugural winner of the WBCA National Defensive Player of the Year award. Game in and game out she guarded the opponents best scorer and held many of the top players in the nation under their scoring averages.

Also in 2006-07, senior Alison Bales was a finalist for the State Farm Wade Trophy as she blocked 151 shots, averaged 11.9 points, 7.8 rebounds and 4.4 blocks on the season. The 151 blocked shots was the second-most in NCAA history.

Duke is the only team in Division I to have at least one representative on each of the Kodak All-America teams since 2001.

» The number 20 jersey, retired by Duke in 2000, is the most coveted in the ACC. It's a jersey that's been worn by some of the greatest players in college basketball history. And now, it's being worn by a young woman named Alana Beard.

Beard, a senior forward, has been named to the All-ACC team and is a leading candidate for the 2009 ACC Player of the Year award.

On Jan. 24, 2004, Alana Beard became the first women's basketball player at Duke to have her jersey retired. The number 20 will hang from the rafters in Cameron Indoor Stadium and won't be worn again by a Blue Devil.

A sellout crowd of 9,314 packed Cameron Indoor Stadium to view the ceremony in a contest versus Tennessee. Beard, a native of Shreveport, La., joined the 11 men's basketball players who have had their jersey retired.

In attendance along with Alana were her parents LeRoy and Marie Beard.

Over her career, Beard was the 2002-03 and 2003-04 National Player of the Year, was a three-time ACC Player of the Year, three-time Kodak All-America, three-time Associated Press All-America, four-time All-ACC Defensive selection and we could go on and on...

Beard left Duke scoring an amazing 2,687 points, which is more than any women's player in Duke history. For her career, Beard registered averages of 19.8 points, 5.8 rebounds, 3.7 assists, 3.0 steals and hit 52.7 percent of her field goals.

Over the four years, she was selected ACC Player of the Week an ACC-record 18 times, which is 11 more than any other player in the 29-year history of the ACC. Beard was also the first player in ACC history to be named ACC Player of the Year for three straight years.

On Sunday, Jan. 20, 2008, Lindsey Harding will have her jersey retired during the contest against N.C. State. Over her career, Harding scored 1,298 points, had a school-record 579 assists, 565 rebounds and 261 steals.

Harding became only the second Duke player (Alana Beard) and sixth ACC player in league history to notch over 1,000 points, 500 assists, 500 rebounds and 250 steals over their career.

Duke has been a springboard for student-athletes going from Durham to the professional ranks after graduation. From playing overseas, in the American Basketball League (ABL) and the Women's National Basketball Association (WNBA), the Blue Devils have been well-represented.

Kira Orr was the first Duke player to be drafted professionally in the ABL in 1997 by the Seattle Reign in the fourth round, while Michele Van Gorp was the second player from the class of 1999 selected in the 1999 WNBA draft. Van Gorp was picked in the second round with the 18th overall pick by the New York Liberty.

In 2000, Peppi Browne was drafted by the Charlotte Sting in the WNBA with the 43rd overall pick in the third round. Due to a knee injury she never played for the Sting.

For the third consecutive year, Duke had a player picked in the 2001 WNBA draft as Georgia Schweitzer was selected in the second round by the Miami Sol with the 21st overall selection. Schweitzer was then traded to the Minnesota Lynx where she played in 70 games in three years.

In the 2004 WNBA Draft, Duke was represented in the first round with two players being picked-- Alana Beard second by the Washington Mystics and Iciss Tillis 11th by the Detroit Shock. Beard became the highest player drafted from the Atlantic Coast Conference and Duke was the only school to have two players drafted in the first round.

Beard has gone on to be named to the WNBA All-Star team three straight years.

Monique Currie was selected third in 2006 by the Charlotte Sting, Mistie Williams was 21st by the Phoenix Mercury before being traded to the Houston Comets, while Jessica Foley was picked 38th by Indiana.

Currie came out in 2006 and was named to the WNBA's All-Rookie Team, after averaging 10.5 points and 3.9 rebounds for the Charlotte Sting. Currie was traded in 2007 to her hometown team -- Washington Mystics.

Last year, Lindsey Harding became the ACC's first No. 1 pick in the WNBA Draft as she was selected by the Phoenix Mercury, before being traded to the Minnesota Lynx. Harding was on her way to being named WNBA Rookie of the Year in 2007 before suffering a torn ACL injury.

Also in 2007, Alison Bales was picked ninth by the Indiana Fever and ended up playing in 17 contests. The Fever advanced to the semifinals of the WNBA playoffs.

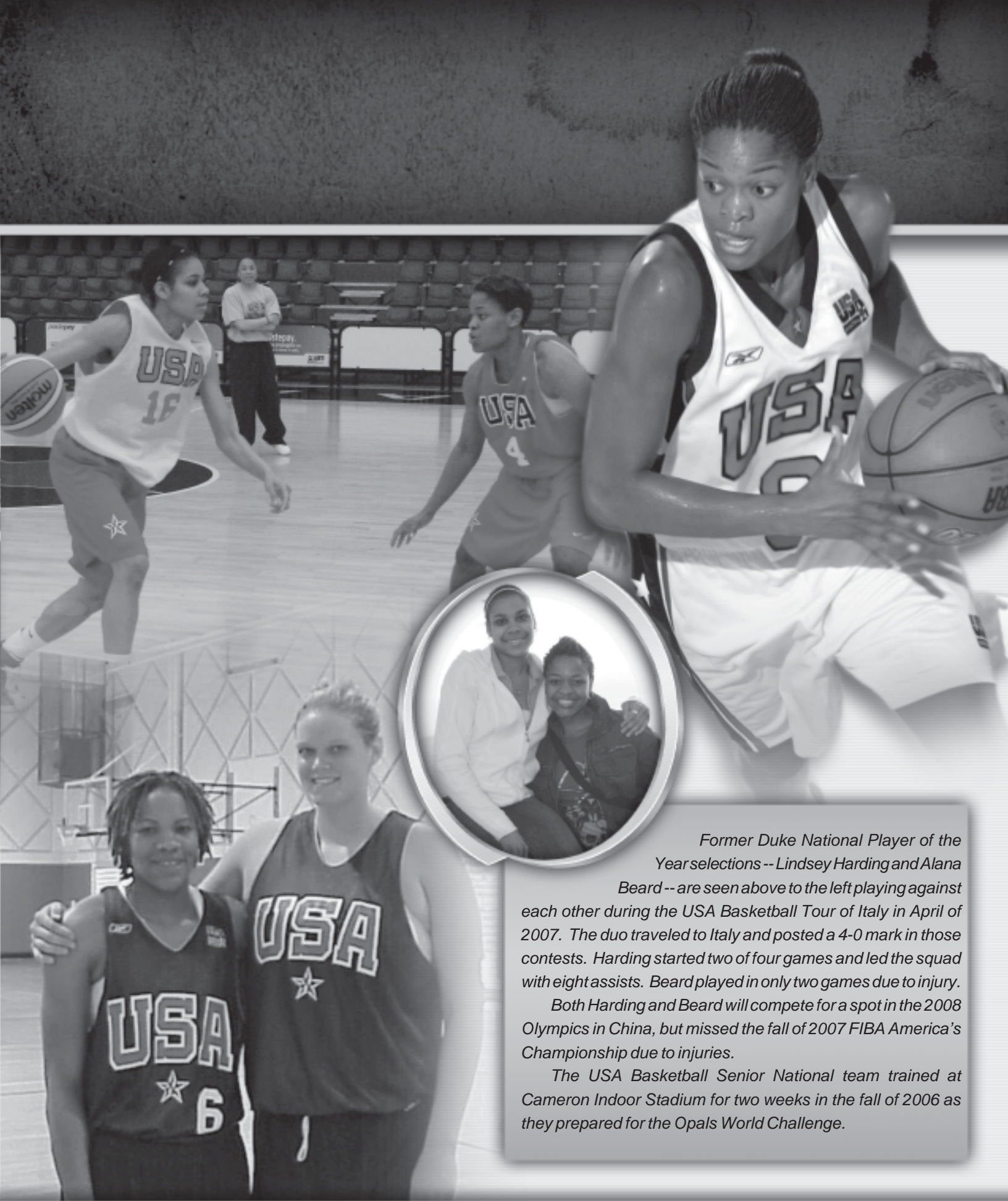

Beard started eight of 11 contests in the 2006 spring training session and led USA to a 10-1 mark. She led the squad with 25 steals and 25 assists as she played the second-most minutes on the team.

In the 2006 Opals World Challenge, Beard started all five games as the USA squad posted a 4-1 record and finished in first place. She averaged 8.6 points, 4.0 rebounds, 2.2 assists and 1.9 steals in the challenge.

She also played in the 2007 Tour of Italy and averaged 8.0 points in two contests before being injured.

The duo traveled to Italy and posted a 4-0 mark in those contests. Harding started two of four games and led the squad with eight assists. Beard played in only two games due to injury.

Both Harding and Beard will compete for a spot in the 2008 Olympics in China, but missed the fall of 2007 FIBA America's Championship due to injuries.

The USA Basketball Senior National team trained at Cameron Indoor Stadium for two weeks in the fall of 2006 as they prepared for the Opals World Challenge.

Growing up in Australia, 2006 graduate Jessica Foley has played on numerous Australian National teams since 1999 and is currently a member of the Senior National team, the 'Price Attack' Opals.

This past summer, Foley played in the World University games and led the squad to a gold medal, while averaging a team-best 16.6 points.

Over the summer of 2005, Foley was selected to play for the World University Games team and the 'Price Attack' Opals squad, but was unable to participate due to an injury.

Foley now plays professionally in Australia for Adelaide in the WNBL.

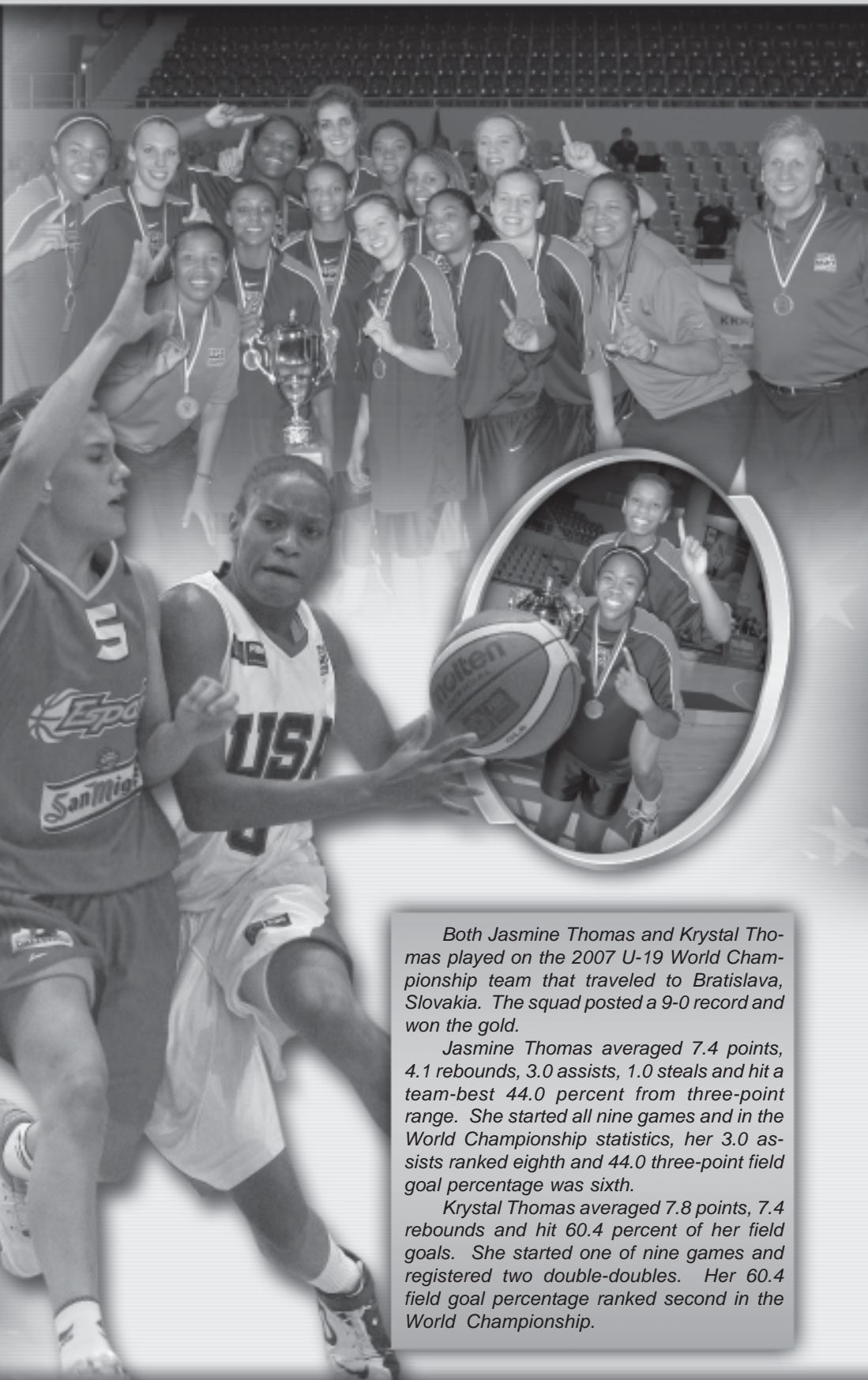


Chris Moreland (left) was Duke's first player to play for USA Basketball in 1986 as she was selected to the 1986 U.S. Olympic Festival squad. Since 2000, the Blue Devils have had at least one representative each summer travel with USA Basketball and has won a total of 14 gold medals in that time. Overall, Duke has garnered 25 medals with USA hoops since 1988.



The Blue Devils have been a mainstay with USA Basketball over the years. In this decade, Duke has registered 20 representatives on USA Basketball squads as players and coaches, the most of any team in the nation.

In 2007 a total of four Blue Devils earned gold medals, tied for the most of any team in the nation (Tennessee).



Both Jasmine Thomas and Krystal Thomas played on the 2007 U-19 World Championship team that traveled to Bratislava, Slovakia. The squad posted a 9-0 record and won the gold.

Jasmine Thomas averaged 7.4 points, 4.1 rebounds, 3.0 assists, 1.0 steals and hit a team-best 44.0 percent from three-point range. She started all nine games and in the World Championship statistics, her 3.0 assists ranked eighth and 44.0 three-point field goal percentage was sixth.

Krystal Thomas averaged 7.8 points, 7.4 rebounds and hit 60.4 percent of her field goals. She started one of nine games and registered two double-doubles. Her 60.4 field goal percentage ranked second in the World Championship.

NCAA Tournament Tidbits...

• **The Basics...** Duke has made 13 consecutive and 14 overall trips to the NCAA Tournament. The Blue Devils made their first appearance in 1987 and since 1995 have advanced to the "Big Dance" each year. Duke now owns an all-time record of 37-14 in NCAA Tournament play and is 38-15 in all postseason action, including the NCAA & WNIT. The Blue Devils have hosted NCAA Tournament games eight times out of 14 appearances.

• **The History...** Each time Duke has been in the NCAA Tournament, it has won at least one game. The Blue Devils have advanced to at least the Sweet 16 the past 10 consecutive years, advanced to the Elite Eight in eight of the last 11 years and to the Final Four three out of the last six seasons. Duke advanced to the Elite Eight in 1998, the National Championship game in 1999, the NCAA Final Four in 2002 and 2003, the Elite Eight in 2004 and 2005 and the National Championship game in 2006. The Blue Devils own a 31-9 record in their last 40 NCAA Tournament games.

• **The Seedings...** The last 12 seasons, Duke has been no lower than a No. 5 seed. From 2001 through 2004 and in 2006 and 2007, Duke was a No. 1 seed. The Blue Devils were a No. 2 seed in 1998, 2000 and 2005.

Looking Back on an Incredible Journey...

From the season's opening tip to the last tick of the clock at the national championship game, the 1998-99 Duke women's basketball team established its place in Duke history and, in the process, earned the respect of the entire country. The Blue Devils entered the season with extremely high expectations, returning all five starters from the 1997-98 squad that advanced to the NCAA Elite Eight for the first time in school history. Expectations were so high, in fact, that Duke started out with its highest ranking ever at fourth nationally in the preseason polls.

Although the season didn't start off as planned, the Blue Devils quickly got back on track, rattling off a school-record 16-game winning streak and barreling through the Atlantic Coast Conference with a 15-1 mark, setting yet another school record. Along the way, Duke also managed to tie or set several other school records, including those of 23 regular-season wins, 29 total wins, 11 victories against ranked opponents and a 15-1 record in Cameron Indoor Stadium.

However, the Blue Devils saved the best part of the journey for last. Entering the NCAA tournament as the No.

3 seed in the East, the team recommitted itself to its goal of a national championship. Playing in the comfort of home for the first and second rounds, Duke took care of business against both Holy Cross and St. Joseph's. Next, the Blue Devils traveled just an hour down the road to compete in the East Regional in Greensboro, N.C. Duke's first opponent, Old Dominion, was tough, but 57 percent shooting by the Blue Devils along with solid, well-executed basketball gave Duke the upper hand and they advanced with a 13-point win. The victory set up an Elite Eight match up with three-time defending national champion Tennessee.

With most of the women's basketball experts across the country calling for the Lady Vol dynasty to win its fourth straight national title, very few people predicted what would happen in the East Regional Final. The game began with Duke's Peppi Browne blocking a Tamika Catchings shot, and the Blue Devils had established control early. The two teams continued to trade baskets, but after Tennessee held an 11-10 lead at the 13:24 mark of the first half, it never led again, with Duke building as much as a 13-point lead in the first half and

heading into the locker room ahead by 11.

The Blue Devils continued to execute the best basketball of their season, withstanding Tennessee rallies and never letting the Vols tie or take the lead. Duke's Georgia Schweitzer emerged as the hero of the game, earning East Regional MVP honors along the way. Faced with the daunting task of defending national Player of the Year Chamique Holdscaw, Schweitzer held her to just eight points on 2-18 shooting while scoring a career-high 22 of her own. In defeating the Lady Vols 69-63, the vision of cutting down the nets became a reality. The Blue Devils celebrated the East Regional title and their first trip to the NCAA Final Four, held in San Jose, Calif.

With a loyal following and thousands of "new" Duke fans behind them in the San Jose Arena, the Blue Devils responded with an impressive performance in the national semifinals against the Georgia Lady Bulldogs.

Duke again shot better than 50 percent and,

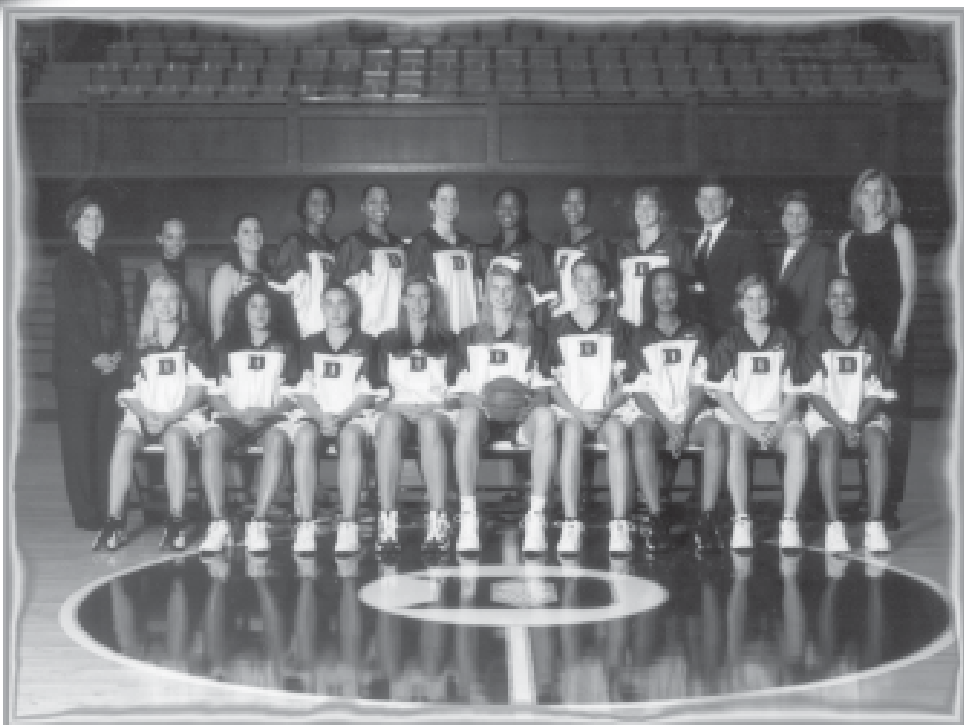
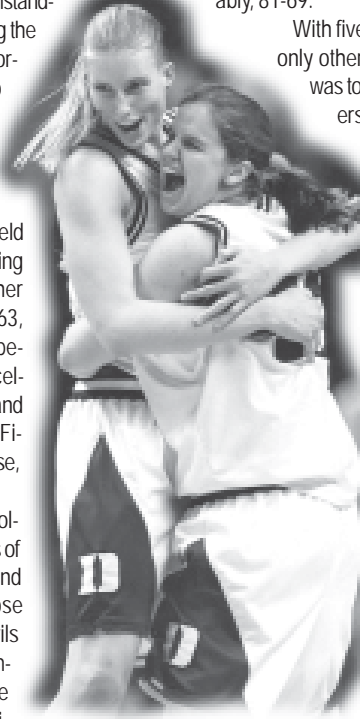
paced by Nicole Erickson's 22 points and Michele VanGorp's 20 points, Duke defeated the 'Dogs comfortably, 81-69.

With five games down and one to go, the only other team left playing in the country was top-ranked Purdue. The Boilermakers, 33-1 on the year, also had a win over Tennessee to their credit, as well as a 31-game winning streak. With neither team playing its best basketball in the title game, Duke held a 22-17 advantage at the half.

In the second half, however, Purdue's highly-rated backcourt, unable to produce in the first half, came alive and sparked a 12-1 Boilermaker run as the game grew out of Duke's reach.

In coming so close to achieving the ultimate goal of a national title, it was disappointing to come up just a few minutes short. However, nobody can ever take away the many outstanding accomplishments of the 1998-99 Blue Devils. The team raised the standard

of the program and created a lasting legacy....

Eight Was Truly Enough...



When you talk about small numbers but large accomplishments, the 2001-02 Duke women's basketball team would fit right in there with the best. The Blue Devils started the season with 10 players and a very young team with only one senior, two juniors, five sophomores and two freshmen.

Duke opened with a bang, knocking off seventh-ranked Texas Tech in the State Farm Tip-Off Classic, but then went through some growing pains. The Blue Devils lost two games to unranked opponents and then assistant coach Joanne Boyle was stricken with an AVM (an arteriovenous malformation).

Another shocker came in the first week of December as two sophomores, Rometra Craig and Crystal White, decided to transfer from Duke right before the team left for its first ACC contest of the year at Virginia. Down two players and an assistant coach, the Blue Devils would have to face the critics who said they couldn't win with only eight players.

Boy, did Duke prove them wrong. The Blue Devils came out of Virginia with a 34-point victory and steamrolled into a six-game winning streak heading into Christmas break. Just two days after break ended, Duke faced second-ranked Tennessee and lost, which proved an eye-opening experience.

The Blue Devils then went on one of the best streaks in the history of the ACC. Duke won its first four ACC contests by an average margin of 25.0 points. For the month of January, sophomore Alana Beard was selected WBCA National Player of the Month after leading Duke to an 8-0 record and averaging 22.1 points, 7.0 rebounds, 3.5 assists, 2.3 steals and 0.6 blocks. The Blue Devils also welcomed Boyle back to the bench in January. The month of February was no different as the Blue Devils

registered only the second perfect 16-0 mark in ACC history.

During the season, Duke dominated the weekly ACC honors as Beard was named ACC Player of the Week five times, while freshmen Monique Currie (five) and Wynter Whitley (once) were selected ACC Rookie of the Week six of the 15 weeks.

The Blue Devils then headed to Greensboro, N.C., for the ACC Tournament in their home away from home - the Greensboro Coliseum. Duke had recorded an 8-0 record in previous games played there and went on to improve the unbelievable mark to 11-0 after downing Florida State, Virginia and North Carolina to win its third

consecutive ACC Tournament title. Currie was selected MVP of the tournament after registering career highs in points (30), rebounds (12) and free throws made (14) in the championship game.

In the week after the tournament, the honors kept coming in as four Blue Devils were selected All-ACC-- Beard (first), Tillis (first), Currie (second) and Sheana Mosch (HM). Beard & Tillis were named to the ACC All-Defensive team and Currie & Whitley to the All-Freshman team, while Beard was named Player of the Year and Gail Goestenkors was selected Coach of the Year.

Next, Duke entered the NCAA Tournament as a No. 1 seed for the second consecutive year. The Blue Devils were placed in the East Region and made quick work of Norfolk State and TCU before traveling 25 miles down the road to the Entertainment & Sports Arena. Duke may have found a second home away from home as the Blue Devils knocked off Texas and South Carolina to advance to the second NCAA Final Four in school history.

The Blue Devils proved all the critics wrong with the accomplishment and were set to travel to San Antonio, Texas for a date with second-ranked Oklahoma. The game didn't go the way Duke wanted, but it was still a true season to remember.

In just two seasons, Beard established herself as one of the best players in college basketball. She became the first ACC women's or men's player to notch over 600 points, 200 rebounds, 150 assists, 100 steals and 20 blocks in a single season.

Duke accomplished many things no other Blue Devil squad had done before-- went a perfect 19-0 in ACC contests, won a third consecutive ACC Tournament title, broke 24 school records, including the mark for wins with 31, and they did it with only eight players.

One Team, One Dream...

As each year passed under the direction of head coach Gail Goestenkors, more records were broken and history was made. This was no different in 2002-03 as the Blue Devils once again broke more than 30 team and individual records on their way to an ACC record 35 wins.

Goestenkors, concluding her 11th season at Duke, guided the Blue Devils to a third NCAA Final Four, fourth consecutive ACC Tournament title, third straight ACC Regular Season title and more wins than any other ACC women's team in history. For all of this, the leader for the Blue Devils received National Coach of the Year accolades for the fourth time in her career.

One thing most people forgot about during the 2002-03 season-- Monique Currie. The Blue Devils lost the 2002 ACC Tournament MVP and All-America candidate in the first minute of the first exhibition contest on Nov. 5 and still managed to accomplish more than any ACC team in league history.

Duke kicked off the season ranked No. 1 in both polls even though the Blue Devils were to be without the services of Currie. The Blue Devils didn't let anyone down early as they cruised to victories over second-ranked Tennessee in the Jimmy V Classic, while also picking up Paradise Jam, Duke Classic and South Padre Tournament titles.

The Blue Devils made quick work of the first half of the ACC slate and then came the matchup with second-ranked Connecticut in Durham, N.C. Cameron Indoor Stadium posted its first sellout in women's



basketball history at Duke, but the Blue Devils couldn't get anything going for the first 30 minutes and fell 77-65.

Duke came back strong from the loss winning the next 15 games in a row and advancing to the NCAA Final Four. During that stretch, the Blue Devils posted their second straight undefeated ACC Regular Season, won yet another ACC Championship and won the Midwest Regional.

All season long junior Alana Beard led the Blue

Devils as she posted incredible numbers, including the eighth-best scoring average in the nation at 22.0. Beard was selected ESPN.com National Player of the Year, Kodak All-America, ACC Player of the Year, Midwest Region MVP and many others. She became only the second Duke player to reach the 2,000 point mark and broke eight Duke game or season records.

Duke received key production from its freshmen as Lindsey Harding started the final 16 contests, Mistie Bass started 15 games for the Blue Devils, Jessica Foley was a key threat from three-point land and Brooke Smith displayed some flashy post moves during the season.

The senior tandem of Michele Matyasovsky and Sheana Mosch provided key leadership for the Blue Devils over the course of the season. Matyasovsky started 36 games for the Blue Devils, while Mosch came off the bench to give an offensive and defensive spark in her final year. Mosch finished off her career as one of 17 players to reach the 1,000 point mark for the Blue Devils.

The Blue Devils garnered a great deal of honors as Beard, Iciss Tillis and Vicki Krapohl were named All-ACC, Bass and Harding were named ACC All-Freshman and Beard was named ACC All-Defensive. Beard and Tillis each received Kodak All-America honors and were on the watch lists for the Wade Trophy and Naismith award. Goestenkors also earned her fifth ACC Coach of the Year award and collected Naismith & WBCA National Coach of the Year accolades.

Banner Year...

From the opening tip to the final buzzer, the 2005-06 Duke women's basketball campaign was one of the most exciting seasons in school history. The Blue Devils began the year ranked No. 1 in the nation and finished No. 2 as Duke fell, 78-75, to third-ranked Maryland in the National Championship game.

Advancing to the NCAA Final Four for the fourth time and the title game for the second time in school history, Duke concluded the season with 31 victories. This marked the sixth straight year the Blue Devils have notched 30 or more victories, which tied an NCAA-record.

As a team, Duke also broke or tied 20 records during the year. Of the 20 records that were broken or tied this season, some of the highlights were Monique Currie's 43 points at Miami, Abby Waner's 50 three-pointers breaking the freshman single season mark, Duke's 36 assists at San Diego, the Blue Devils' 86-point margin of victory against Ball State as well as the single season records for points, field goal percentage, assists and for the second straight year posting a NCAA-record 267 blocks.

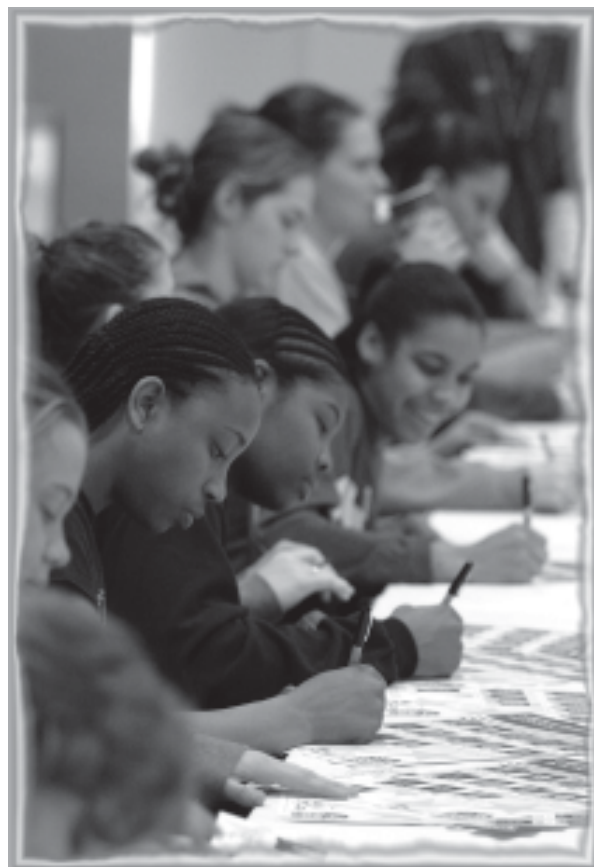
The Blue Devils opened with 20 straight wins to tie the school-record for best start in the history of the program and went on to knock off eight ranked opponents, while falling to four teams all ranked in the top-four in the nation. During the 20-game win streak, the Blue Devils thumped

top-ranked Tennessee, 77-57, knocked off sixth-ranked Maryland in College Park in front of 16,097 fans and defeated 22nd-ranked Boston College, 66-52, on the road.

Duke received well-deserved honors during the season as Currie garnered Kodak All-America accolades for the second straight year as well as earning Associated Press second team, John R. Wooden Award and USBWA All-America. Currie and Lindsey Harding were named to the All-ACC first team, while Mistie Williams was selected to the second team. Harding went on to be named ACC Defensive Player of the Year and Waner earned All-ACC Freshman team honors.

A trio of seniors -- Currie, Williams and Jessica Foley -- closed out their careers with the Blue Devils in style, while all three made their mark in the Duke record book. Currie became the first player in ACC history to register over 2,000 points, 800 rebounds, 400 assists and 200 steals in a career and finished ranking third on the Duke scoring chart with 2,122 points. She became only the third Duke player to reach the 2,000 career point mark and was 10th on the ACC career scoring list.

Williams became the fifth player in Duke history to notch over 1,400 points and 800 rebounds and concluded her excellent career with 1,409 points, which ranked eighth. Foley



was one of the top three-point shooters in school history finishing second on the career charts in both three-pointers made (175) and attempted (490). She also ranked 21st on the ACC charts in three-pointers made and 22nd in attempts.

Junior Alison Bales made some of the biggest strides during the season and especially in the NCAA Tournament as the 6-7 center broke out on the national scene averaging 13.5 points, 9.0 rebounds, 5.0 blocks, 2.2 assists and 1.5 steals during the six contests. For her efforts, she was named the Bridgeport Regional MVP and earned NCAA Final Four All-Tournament team accolades. She broke the NCAA Tournament record for blocks in a tournament (30) and blocks in a career (51).

The key aspect to the success of the 2005-06 Blue Devils was the total team effort as nine players averaged 5.4 points or more and no player averaged more than 28.9 minutes a contest. Duke led the nation in scoring (86.0), assists (20.5), blocked shots (7.6), field goal percentage (49.8) and scoring margin (27.7).

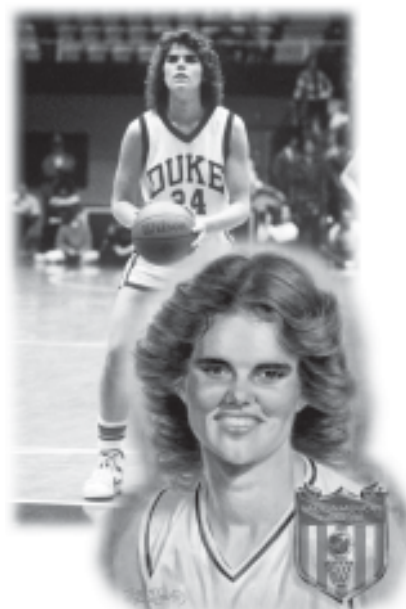

2002 Hall of Honor Induction Class

On January 19, 2002, Duke University honored and immortalized five former women's basketball players in the new Duke Basketball Hall of Honor in Cameron Indoor Stadium. The criteria for inclusion was that none of these players had their jerseys retired at Duke while earning at least one of the following honors: National Player of the Year, National Defensive Player of the Year, All-America, multiple All-Conference selections or Olympic Gold Medalist for the United States. The inaugural class includes (left to right): Katie Meier (1985-90), Sue Harnett (1986-91), Georgia Schweitzer (1997-2001), Chris Moreland (1984-88) and Michele VanGorp (1997-99).
