

The Head Coach



Robbie Church Eighth Year At Duke 79-54-16 Record

Coming off an impressive NCAA College Cup Elite Eight run in 2007, Head Coach Robbie Church will boast one of his most talented squads this year since arriving at Duke in 2001. The Blue Devils return

nine starters and once again welcome a stellar recruiting class to the mix.

Over the last five years, Church has led Duke to 62 victories, five NCAA College Cup appearances and brought in four recruiting classes ranked in the top-eight nationally, including the third-best recruiting class in the nation in 2006.

The Blue Devils return nine of 11 starters and 17 letterwinners off last year's 10-6-7 overall and 3-3-4 ACC squad, which knocked off 21st-ranked South Carolina, 13th-ranked Georgia and Indiana on the road to advance to the NCAA College Cup quarterfinals before falling to 12th-ranked Notre Dame, 3-2, in South Bend, Ind.

For the second straight season in 2007, Duke registered eight one-goal contests and a total of seven ties, but put it all together when it counted in the NCAA Tournament. The Blue Devils were ranked as high as 10th nationally during the season. Junior Lorraine Quinn garnered All-America accolades and then went on to help the United States U-23 National Team claim the Nordic Cup title over the summer.

The 2006 season was one of close matches as well with the Blue Devils registering eight one-goal games and four ties. One of the major highlights was knocking off third-ranked Florida State on senior day with a 3-1 victory and senior Rebecca



Moros earned All-America accolades.

In 2005, the Blue Devils were ranked as high as sixth in the nation and knocked off top-ranked North Carolina on its home field with a 2-1 victory in Chapel Hill. The win was only the second in school history over the Tar Heels. Senior defender Carolyn Ford went on to be selected as the ACC Defensive Player of the Year as Duke registered 11 shutouts.

In 2004, the Blue Devils collected a 15-8 overall and 5-4 ACC mark. Church led Duke to an NCAA Tournament Sweet sixteen appearance and the five league victories was the most since 1997. For his efforts, Church was named NSCAA/ adidas South Region Coach of the Year.

Church, who replaced former head coach Bill Hempen in 2001, is only the second coach in Duke's 20-year history. Over the past eight years, Church has brought in recruiting classes rated in the top 25 by Soccerbuzz.com - third in 2006, seventh in 2002, eighth in 2003 and 2007, 20th in 2004 and 22nd in 2008.

The Head Coach

Church earned his 100th career victory as a women's head coach against Florida International on Sept. 20, 2002, and collected his 200th career victory on Sept. 26, 2003, against Davidson.

In 2003, he guided the Blue Devils to 14 victories, which equaled the most wins for Duke since 1994, and to the second round of the NCAA Tournament. Church did all of this with only three seniors, as 16 of 22 letterwinners were underclassmen. The Blue Devils finished with a 4-3 record in the ACC, which tied for third place, and were ranked as high as sixth nationally.

Before arriving at Duke, Church compiled a 21-19-1 record in two seasons as head coach at Vanderbilt. He led the Commodores to the Southeastern Conference (SEC) Tournament semifinals in each of his two seasons.

In 1994, Church became the first head coach at UNC Charlotte, a position he held until 1998. While at Charlotte, he guided the 49ers to a 66-30-10 mark in five seasons, including the school's first NCAA Tournament bid in 1998 and three Conference USA titles.

Church coached men's college teams at Lynn University (1990), East Carolina (1982-84) and Belmont Abbey (1985-89), where he also served as associate athletic director.

Church began his career as a head coach at East Carolina from 1982-84. In 1984, he was a men's assistant coach at Duke under John Rennie. After a one-year stint with the Blue Devils, Church accepted the head coach and associate athletic director position at Belmont Abbey.

Over the next five years, he led the Crusaders to a 69-35-1 record, while graduating 90 percent of his players. Included in that stretch were two Carolinas Conference Championships and an NAIA National Tournament appearance in 1989.

Church moved on to the College of Boca Raton, now Lynn University, in 1990, leading the men's team to an 17-4-2 mark. In one season, he guided Boca Raton to the District 25 Championship and the NAIA national finals.

Throughout his 22 years as a college head coach, Church has amassed a record of 262-168-30. He was recognized as the Carolinas Conference and NAIA Coach of the Year in 1989, the NSCAA/adidas South Region Coach of the Year in 2004 and the Conference USA Coach of the Year in 1997. In addition, Church was the NAIA South Region Coach of the Year in 1988 and 1989. He was also tabbed the NAIA District 26 Coach of the Year in 1988 and NAIA District 25 Coach of the Year in 1990.

In 1991, Church left the college ranks to become the head men's and women's soccer coach at Charlotte Country Day School. In three seasons at the helm of the men's program, Church compiled a 40-22-9 record, including a state finals appearance in 1993. The women's program was equally successful during his two seasons as head coach, tallying a 24-7-3 mark and winning the 1992 state championship.

A four-year starter at Pfeiffer College, Church was his team's leading scorer and MVP as a senior. He was selected NAIA All-South Region, was an All-Conference performer, and was inducted into the school's Sports Hall of Fame in 1998. He graduated from Pfeiffer with a bachelor of arts degree in health and physical education in 1981. Church went on to earn his master's degree in health and physical education from the University of South Carolina in 1985.

Church and his wife, the former Linda Atkins, have two children, Ashley (21) and Kyle (19). Ashley is a 2008 graduate of UNC Wilmington and was a four-year letterwinner on the women's soccer team, Kyle will be a junior at Charlotte and is a member of the men's basketball squad. The Church family resides in Durham.

Billy Lesesne Associate Head Coach • 8th Season



Billy Lesesne begins his eighth season with the Duke women's soccer program and his fifth as associate head coach. He had spent three seasons as assistant coach before being promoted over the summer of 2004. In addition to his coaching duties at Duke, Lesesne was a North Carolina ODP state coach and Region III staff coach in 2002-03.

Lesesne came to Duke from Vanderbilt, where he served as current Duke head coach Robbie Church's assistant for one season, guiding the team to the semifinals of the Southeastern Conference Tournament (SEC) in 2000.

Before his two-year stint at Vanderbilt, Lesesne was the head coach of the men's and women's soccer programs at his alma mater, Erskine College, for six years. There he earned several coaching honors, including NSCAA Division II Women's South Region Coach of the Year and Carolina's Virginia Athletic Conference Women's Coach of the Year in 1997, after leading the Lady Fleet to a 15-2-1 record and the conference championship. He also won the Carolina's Virginia Athletic Conference Messick Award for Sportsmanship in 1996, 1997 and 1998, as well as the conference award for highest graduation rates for student-athletes.

Lesesne began his coaching career at Cambridge Academy in Greenwood, S.C., in 1988 before serving as the assistant men's coach at the College of Charleston from 1990-91. He also coached the South Carolina's Boys' State Olympic Development Program team from 1990-95 and the Girls' State ODP team from 1996-99.

Lesesne enjoyed a successful playing career, playing three years of professional soccer with the Charleston Battery (USISL/A-League) and four years at Erskine College where he was a NAIA All-America his senior year and an NSCAA All-South honoree his last two seasons. He also earned NAIA All-District 6 honors from 1983-86 and was the Jake Todd/Erskine College Senior Athlete Award winner for the 1986-87 school year. He graduated from Erskine in 1987 with a bachelor's degree in biology/natural science.

Lesesne has one daughter, Victoria, who was born on March 11, 2005. They reside in Durham.



Carla Overbeck Assistant Coach • 17th Season



In her collegiate coaching debut, Carla Overbeck made an immediate impact on the Duke University women's soccer program, helping the 1992 Blue Devils advance to the NCAA title game. Over the last 16 years, she has continued her work with the Blue Devils as Duke has advanced to the NCAA Tournament 14 times.

A three-time All-America selection at the University of North Carolina, Overbeck was a member of four unbeaten Tar Heel national title squads from 1986-89. North Carolina posted a phenomenal 95-match unbeaten streak (89-0-6) during her career.

Overbeck was a four-time member of the NCAA All-Tournament Team and a two-time All-ACC selection. In addition, she was a member of the 1986 *Soccer America* All-America Freshman Team and was the Most Valuable Defensive Player of the 1988 NCAA Tournament.

Overbeck's playing accomplishments include competing for the United States National Team. Overbeck was an instrumental player for the U.S. in winning the 1991 Women's World Cup in China. She captained the 1995 U.S. World Cup squad that advanced to the semifinals and also served as captain of the 1996 U.S. Olympic Team that won the gold medal.

In 1998, Overbeck competed on the gold-medal-winning Goodwill Games squad. She again captained Team USA to the 1999 World Cup Championship and to a silver medal in the 2000 Olympic Games in Sydney, Australia.

On May 6, 2006, Overbeck was elected to the National Soccer Hall of Fame. Overbeck, who graduated from North Carolina with a degree in psychology in 1990, attended Richardson High School in Richardson, Texas. She and her husband, Greg, have one son, Jackson (11) and a daughter, Carson Elizabeth (5).

Nathan Kipp Goalkeeper Coach • 3rd Season



Nathan Kipp, a 2000 graduate of UNC Greensboro, begins his third season as goalkeepers coach with the Blue Devils. Over the last two years, Kipp helped guide Allison Lipsher to 16 shutouts and a 0.87 goals against average.

A four-year letterwinner at UNCG, Kipp played from 1996-99 and was the starting goalkeeper as a junior and senior. He finished his career with 124 saves and a 0.96 goals against average. As a junior, Kipp's squad registered a 16-2-2 record leading UNCG to the second round of the NCAA Tournament for the first time in school history. In addition, he earned 1998 Southern

Conference Tournament MVP honors and 1999 All-Southern Conference Tournament team accolades.

A CoSIDA/Academic All-District selection in 1998, Kipp obtained his degree in physics from UNCG. In 2001 and 2002, Kipp served as an assistant coach and goalkeepers coach with UNC Greensboro. He then spent two seasons as an assistant coach for the Iona College women's soccer team before returning to UNC Greensboro in 2005.

Kipp is a native of Gambier, Ohio, and played for the Carolina Dynamo in 2001 and 2002. He went on to capture United Soccer League's Goalkeeper of the Year honors after leading the league with a 0.87 goals against average in 2002.

Kipp resides in Hillsborough, N.C.

DUKE WOMEN'S SOCCER ALUMNAE

Few places of higher education have the ability to claim that it encompasses the best combination of academics and athletics. Student athletes at Duke University experience the best in both athletic competition and success in the classroom. Success plays an integral role in the University's culture, and Duke alumni go on to enjoy successful futures in a variety of professional avenues. Several Blue Devil women's soccer alumnae have entered into coaching careers, while others have opted to join the business and professional worlds.

With the inception of the Women's United Soccer Association (WUSA) in the spring of 2001, former Duke University players had the opportunity to continue their soccer careers in more than just the coaching realm, but in 2003 the financial backing was not there and the league was suspended. There is hope the league will start back up in the near future.

WUSA's inaugural season embraced three former Blue Devils into the League. Class of 1996 member and three-time All-America selection Kelly Walbert was drafted by the Atlanta Beat in the sixth round as the 81st overall pick. Class of 1998 member and two time All-America selection Kristy Whelchel was selected in the third round as the 20th overall pick by the New York Power. Finally, 2000 graduate and All-America selection Sherrill Kester headed west, as she was selected in the second round as the 14th overall pick by the San Diego Spirit. These decorated individuals demonstrate only some of the talent and accomplishments of Duke women's soccer alumnae.

Duke Academics

At a time when college athletics are under close scrutiny for its academic shortcomings, the Duke athletic program remains a shining example of what can be accomplished with the proper perspective. The commitment to excellence is obvious in all of Duke's sports programs. All of the Blue Devil teams have graduation rates near 100 percent every year. Duke is also well represented on the ACC Honor Roll. For 20 consecutive years, Duke has had the most student-athletes on the conference list, which recognizes athletes who compile at least a 3.0 grade point average for the year.

This past year, Christie McDonald earned NSCAA /adidas Scholar All-America. In 2007, Rachel-Rose Cohen was selected ESPN The Magazine Academic All-America for the second straight year, while Carolyn Ford earned 2005 NSCAA/adidas Academic All-America honors. Duke also had five student-athletes selected to the All-ACC Academic team in 2008-- Rebecca Allen, Kelly Hathorn, McDonald, Gretchen Miller and Lorraine Quinn.

The Duke administration and the athletic department both embrace the philosophy that receiving a meaningful degree is the primary goal of attending college.

As a result, Duke has compiled one of the nation's most impressive reputations for its dedication to excellence on and off the field. Academic Coordinator T.J. Grams helps student-athletes with course selection and monitors their progress toward graduation. Leslie Barnes directs the Blue Devil Career Development Program, which assists student-athletes with the career development process. Duke's Associate Athletic Director Brad Berndt oversees the Blue Devils' academic support program.

An additional asset for the student-athletes is the Michael Krzyzewski Center for Athletic Excellence, which houses a state-of-the-art study center for all Duke student-athletes. The center opened in 2008 and includes a general study area along with computers, individual tutoring rooms, a classroom, resource room and staff offices, which will be open 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

Why has Duke's athletic program excelled on the academic front? In part, the answer lies in the type of student-athletes recruited by Blue Devil coaches and the admissions process itself. One of the chief criteria is the projected ability to graduate, and the coaches make that a priority in recruiting.

But in essence, it all goes back to commitment, to the desire to field a program that features true student-athletes.

At Duke University, the institution remains confident that a distinguished school can play a significant role in intercollegiate athletics, while at the same time developing young adults to lead our world into a new generation and beyond. Student-athletes choosing Duke get the best of both worlds.

The value of Duke's commitment to its athletes can be seen in the careers that many of them choose after college. They are doctors, lawyers, engineers. Some go directly into the job market, while others head to graduate school. Whatever the plans, a Duke degree is an invaluable commodity. That's why choosing a college is not just a four-year decision.

Koskinen Stadium

When people speak of the top soccer facilities in the South and in the nation, Duke's Koskinen Stadium comes to mind. In a relatively short period, the cozy stadium has emerged into one of the finest soccer complexes in the country.

Koskinen Stadium, named and dedicated in 1999 through the support of John and Patricia Koskinen, is situated ideally on Duke University's West Campus. It sits adjacent to the William David Murray Building and near both Wallace Wade Stadium and Cameron Indoor Stadium. This location -- in the heart of Duke's athletic complex -- allows easy access for Duke fans both on campus and throughout the local community.

From a spectator's standpoint, there's not a bad seat in the house as the aluminum bleachers flank each sideline to allow for 4,500 fans with standing room only areas pushing the capacity to approximately 7,000. The Bermuda grass playing surface is 75 yards by 120 yards with an underground irrigation system that keeps it in top condition year round, while lights, added in 1984, have afforded the Blue Devils scheduling flexibility.

Located on the stadium's West side, the press box provides ample room in the divided press area for writers, as well as having adequate space for radio and television crews. Home Team Sports, Fox Soccer Channel, Fox Sports Net as well as other television affiliates have reached a nationwide audience with its coverage of ACC Tournament action from Koskinen Stadium's comfortable vantage.

Renovations continue to improve the facility. Work was completed in 2005 on a field house which features two locker rooms and a viewing deck. In addition, permanent concession stands and restrooms have been added to the comfort of Duke soccer fans. Duke brick around the bleachers, along with stadium fencing, also now enhance Koskinen Stadium.

The facility continues to be the site of numerous prime soccer events, including the Atlantic Coast Conference Men's Soccer Tournament in 1987, 1989, 1990 and 1995. The 1989 ACC Women's Soccer Tournament called the Duke Soccer Stadium home, as did the 1992 and 2000 tournament.

The stadium also serves as the site of one of the South's premier soccer tournaments in the "Duke/adidas Soccer Classic", which draws outstanding crowds to watch the nation's top collegiate teams in early-season action. This year on Sept. 19 and 21, Duke welcomes Georgia, Fordham and North Carolina.

In 1987, Duke was the soccer competition site for the United States Olympic Festival with the gold medal game playing host to a standing room- only crowd of almost 7,000 spectators.

In 2000, Koskinen Stadium was the host of the ACC Women's Soccer Tournament. The final game between Duke and North Carolina drew the largest crowd (5,273) in the history of Duke women's soccer at Koskinen Stadium. It was also the fifth largest game attendance in a women's soccer game not including the NCAA Tournament and the 16th biggest crowd in Division I women's soccer history.

The Blue Devils have hosted five NCAA Tournament matches over the past 16 years, including first-round games in 1992, 1996, 1997, 1999 and 2000, and a second-round match-up in 1995. During the spring of 1984, the Blue Devils also hosted the U.S. Olympic Team.

The Blue Devils enjoy their home field advantage. Over the past 20 years, Duke's home record is 113-50-5. The squad is 84-33-9 over the last 15 seasons at home.

The soccer team enjoys the use of its own

locker room and meeting room in the Murray Building. Each player has a locker with storage areas for extra equipment at each space. The squad also has the use of a spacious practice field close to the stadium. Enclosed by the woods that surround the Duke Golf Club, this field allows the team to practice on a playing surface other than the game field and provides a private setting for the soccer team to work out.

The Murray Building, which opened in 1986, cost \$2.4 million to construct. It not only serves as a home for the lacrosse and soccer offices, this facility also houses the athletic training and weight rooms.

The modern training room provides all of the equipment and services necessary in keeping the Duke soccer team healthy and in action. Women's soccer trainer Emily Norcross' office is off the main training area, allowing the players convenient access to her care.

The weight room is another extensive area, directed under the watchful eye of strength coordinator Anne Tamporello. The 3,300 square foot facility boasts over three tons of free weights, along with Nautilus, HydraGym and Universal stations, making it one of the most complete weight rooms in the country.




Duke University was created in 1924 by James Buchanan Duke as a memorial to his father, Washington Duke. The Dukes, a Durham family who built a worldwide financial empire in the manufacture of tobacco and developed the production of electricity in the two Carolinas, had long been interested in Trinity College. Trinity traced its roots to 1838 in nearby Randolph County when local Methodist and Quaker communities joined forces to support a permanent school, which they named Union Institute. After a brief period as Normal College (1851-59), the school changed its name to Trinity College in 1859 and affiliated with the Methodist Church.

The college moved to Durham in 1892 with financial assistance from Washington Duke and the donation of land by Julian S. Carr. In December 1924, the school's trustees gratefully accepted the provisions of James B. Duke's indenture creating the family philanthropic foundation, The Duke Endowment, which provided, in part, for the expansion of Trinity College into Duke University.

As a result of the Duke gift, Trinity underwent both physical and academic expansion. The original Durham Campus became known as East Campus when it was rebuilt in stately Georgian architecture. West Campus, Gothic in style and dominated by the soaring 210-foot tower of Duke Chapel, opened in 1930. Academic expansion of the university included the establishment of new graduate and professional schools.

Modern times have seen Duke realize its founder's aspirations to become a major center of learning. The Duke University Medical Center has achieved international prominence, and many Duke schools and departments are consistently ranked among the nation's best.
